

I intended to further subdivide this online bibliography into sections for religion, psychology, sociology, criminology, psychopathology; science, culture, anthropology; pastoral care; penal history; pre-1800, 1800–1900; works by reformers, by chaplains, by wardens, by convicts; newspapers; etc.—but I've done enough.

This is the annotated bibliography that contains the information as given in each footnote throughout the book on the author and the book. While many of the footnotes contained web links that seemed pertinent, many auxiliary links—like to Google Book editions—were removed from the text and retained here. In several cases, instead of the usual convention of placing multiple books in alphabetical order under a single author, we placed the most pertinent to prison and the Seminary Scam first, followed by those in alphabetical order, and the articles following the books. Duplicates appear as when articles are about someone, like the 19 on Warden Burl Cain, where they appear under the author's name and then collected under the subject's name. It is important to see the number of articles on Cain referenced, almost all negative, and not one corrective. To date and to my knowledge, Cain himself has not written anything himself.

About three times, duplicates under different first names to allow someone to find a source, as in "Disciplinaries in TDCJ" and "TDCJ Disciplinaries" where you can find the link to the first publication in TDCJ history of 86k disciplinaries. We wanted to make it as easy as possible for the honorary to cross check and verify sources. And Bergner, Ridgeway, and Shere duplicated under Cain for obvious reasons. And the interviews on the Polunsky Fiasco are included under each of the four staffers for clarity on the nefariousness that the wardens knew about for years. The 250+ internet links were not all, as many were just auxiliary to a topic in a footnote. As mentioned, perhaps about 50 were not even in the footnotes in the text, as some were simply removed to save additional space in the text and to be supplied here for those diligent souls.

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## 1. Further Research – 87 NEEDS for More Grant-funded Study

Up from 65 in First Edition to at least 85 in Second Edition, listed by page number are the topics discussed in the book that are in *great need* of further study, even grantfunded research, almost all of them a greater need than the million-dollar frog-to-prince work done in Texas and in Angola by the ISR Johnson team.

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

Sam Houston State University is one of repositories of Bennett's voluminous writings, titled "James V. Bennett Collection, 1905-1971" in the SHSU Special Collections & University Archives. He was the longest director of the Federal Bureau of Prisons, 1937–1964. He was a veteran of the U.S. Army Air Corps and served as an Investigator for the U.S. Bureau of Efficiency where he authored "The Federal Penal and Correctional Problem" (1928) that helped pave the way for the creation of the Bureau of Prisons. He served as an Assistant Director for the BOP from 1930-1937 at its inception, helped draft much of the legislation that affected Federal corrections, including the laws that established the Bureau and Federal Prison Industries. Bennett developed the Bureau's inmate classification system and he worked hard to expand FPI's education, vocational training, and work programs to meet inmate needs. He was member of U.S. delegations to the International Penal and Penitentiary Congress and the United Nations' Congress on the Prevention of Crime and president of the National Association for Better Broadcasting, Joint Commission on Correctional Manpower and Training, American Correctional Association (ACA), and chairman of American Bar Association Section on Criminal Law. He received the President's Award for Distinguished Federal Civilian Service, the War Department's Exceptional Civilian Service Medal, and ACA's E.R. Cass Award.

We live in an age of financial technology (known as "fintech"), where people are accustomed to digitally sending or receiving money from friends and family at little or no cost. A service like Venmo allows no-fee personal transfers from bank accounts or debit cards (payments from a credit card are subject to a 3% fee). Other companies providing similar services charge roughly equivalent fees. We looked at 33 state prison systems where fee information was available. We found rates ranging from 5% to 37% for online transfers. The average fee is 19% for a \$20 online transfer, with a slight decline for higher-dollar transfers (the average fee for a \$50 transfer is 12%). Fees for phone or in-person payments (options more likely to appeal to low-income people without a bank account) were generally higher than for online payments. There is no reasonable explanation why prison money transfers are so much more expensive than regular 'free world' services like Venmo."



Jayson Larson, "We All Walk with a Limp," (pp. 8–9), was a question-answer form with Mike Schumacher, where Larson asked him five (5) questions and he answered about the church leaders and their struggles that he and his crew 14 certified counselors handle, including "500 appointments a month"! He is an associate pastor at Sagemont Church in Houston, and he listed no standard qualifications. McAllen's First Baptist Pastor Chuck Lawless, "5 Ways Pastors Can Manage Their Own Mental Health," (p. 10), including the first being intentionally develop friendships, then prayer group, find a few other believers, take time off, and lastly not to be afraid to see a "Christian counselor," where Lawless is the dean of doctoral studies and vice president of spiritual formation at Southeastern Seminary. Lilly Park, "Come Together," (pp. 12–13), whose hook was, "Counseling leaders say biblical friendships, churches helping each other key to navigating mental health issues," as she presented a few paragraphs from eight other Christian counselors. Park is a professor of biblical counseling at SWBTS. Mansfield's First Baptist Pastor Spencer Plumlee, "Pastor, You Don't Have to 'Play Injured,'" (p 19), where he gives a few standard devotional practices for spiritual and emotional health. The lawsuits, loss of funding, and the resignations of several top administrators who would *not* yield to the nefariousness have all together forced the VFMA to the brink, even to selling its name (Trademarked brand) to be used for a K-12 school in Qatar! In one opening preface that he later fleshed out in great detail, Craven noted, "culture replete with assaults, verbal abuse, hazing, and sexual violence that had resulted in police visits, lawsuits, and a cold war pitting recalcitrant trustees and administrators against reform-minded parents, alumni, and cadets." One difference between VFMA and TDCJ is that TDCJ's prisoners and most of its good employees have yet to be privy to executive culture of cover up and have less of an ability—or near impossibility—of easy media access to the prison grounds.

Chicago, 2016; 304 pp. Of central importance in this second volume is Kant's explicit justification of the death penalty in the *Metaphysics of Morals*. Thoroughly deconstructing Kant's position—which holds the death penalty as exemplary of the eyefor-an-eye Talionic law—Derrida exposes numerous damning contradictions and exceptions. Keeping the current death penalty in the United States in view, he further explores the "anesthesial logic" he analyzed in volume one, addressing the themes of cruelty and pain through texts by Robespierre and Freud, reading Heidegger, and—in a fascinating, improvised final session—the nineteenth-century Spanish Catholic thinker Donoso Cortés. Ultimately, Derrida shows that the rationality of the death penalty as represented by Kant involves an imposition of knowledge and calculability on a fundamental condition of non-knowledge—that we don't otherwise know what or when our deaths will be. In this way, the death penalty acts out a phantasm of mastery over one's own death.

Chicago: University of Chicago, 2009; 368 pp. "Goes to the very heart of his lifelong project of deconstructing the logocentric bias of Western thinking"—Choice. tFrom UOC site, "When he died in 2004, Jacques Derrida left behind a vast legacy of unpublished material, much of it in the form of written lectures. With *The Beast and the Sovereign*, Volume 1, the University of Chicago Press inaugurates an ambitious series, edited by Geoffrey Bennington and Peggy Kamuf, translating these important works into English, launches the series with Derrida's exploration of the persistent association of bestiality or animality with sovereignty. In this seminar from 2001–2002, Derrida continues his deconstruction of the traditional determinations of the human. The beast and the sovereign are connected, he contends, because neither animals nor kings are subject to the law—the sovereign stands above it, while the beast falls outside the law from below. He then traces this association through an astonishing array of texts, including La Fontaine's fable "The Wolf and the Lamb," Hobbes's biblical sea monster in Leviathan, D. H. Lawrence's poem "Snake," Machiavelli's *Prince* with its elaborate comparison of princes and foxes, a historical account of Louis XIV attending an elephant autopsy, and Rousseau's evocation of werewolves in The Social Contract."

Dever, William G. *Has Archeology Buried the Bible?* Grand Rapids: Eerdmans, 2020; 158 pp. Dever is professor emeritus of Near Eastern archaeology and anthropology at the University of Arizona in Tucson, served as director of the Nelson Glueck School of Biblical Archaeology in Jerusalem, as director of the W. F. Albright Institute of Archaeological Research in Jerusalem, and as a visiting professor at universities around the world. He gives a short overview of the development of archeology and then debunks most of the traditional O.T. miracles as either impossible or non-historical. Griffith, Aaron. God's Law and Order: The Politics of Punishment in Evangelical America. Cambridge, MA: Harvard University Press, 2020; 352 pp. He is a professor of modern American history at Whitworth University, a former fellow at the John C. Danforth Center on Religion and Politics, and instructor at Washington University's Prison Education Project. He won the 2021 Emerging Public Intellectual Award, hosted by Redeemer University. Writing for Religion News Service, Yonat Shimron said, "Griffith explores how evangelicals have overlooked systemic racial inequalities and disparities that drove their approach to crime and punishment." John Brown University Professor of History Trisha Posey said this book "examines the controversial issue of the prison system by exploring the 20th and early-21st centuries. Facts that contradict personal prejudices can simply be disbelieved indeed, the fool can counter by criticizing them, and if they are undeniable, they can just be pushed aside as trivial exceptions. So the fool, as distinct from the scoundrel, is completely self-satisfied. In fact, they can easily become dangerous, as it does not take much to make them aggressive. For that reason, greater caution is called for than with a malicious one. Never again will we try to persuade the stupid person with reasons, for it is senseless and dangerous.... In conversation with [the foolish person], one virtually feels that one is dealing not at all with a person, but with slogans, catchwords and the like that have taken possession of him. He is under a spell, blinded, misused, and abused in his very being. Having thus become a mindless tool, the stupid person will also be capable of any evil and at the same time incapable of seeing that it is evil."

Long article on President Danny Akin of Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary in Wake Forest, North Carolina, is quoted:

"I can tell you from the bottom of my heart, I have never been more proud of any graduates that I have had the joy of presiding over," an ebullient Akin said in his graduation address, noting he was "honored beyond words" to have his name inscribed on their diplomas.

The graduation marks a first for the North Carolina prison system, which to date offers no other in-person accredited bachelor's program for some 30,000 state prisoners. But the degree program is part of a fledgling movement of evangelical seminaries, colleges and universities to rehabilitate prisoners through education.

There are at least 17 evangelical schools offering 23 degree programs at prisons across the country, according to the Prison Seminary Foundation, a Christian nonprofit that supports such efforts. In most of them, seminary professors teach in-person and online to inmates with at least eight years left on their sentence. (Southeastern's program requires inmates applying for the program to have a minimum of 12 years of incarceration left so they can complete their studies and gain experience serving as field ministers.)

At a time when some conservative evangelicals liken "social justice" to a postmodern ideology inconsistent with the Bible, the push for prison reform through education is quietly taking root.

"This could very well be a template for post-secondary higher education in prison," said Julie Jailall,

superintendent for prison education at the state's Department of Public Safety. "It meets all expectations for what a prison education program should be." ...

In their new positions as field ministers, the men will not be expected to preach or convert other inmates to Christianity. The prison system cannot promote one faith over others, said Jailall. But they will be expected to counsel and mentor inmates and to encourage them to seek out opportunities to better themselves....

It costs Southeastern \$500,000 a year to run the prison program. The college has also secured supplemental funding from the Sunshine Lady Foundation and the North Carolina Baptist State Convention, said Seth Bible, director of the prison program and an assistant professor of ethics and the history of ideas at Southeastern....

At the graduation ceremony in North Carolina, which was followed by a catered lunch for graduates and their families, Southeastern leaders made it clear they wanted graduates to be "ambassadors for Christ," in the words of Joe Gibbs and Danny Akin at the graduation ceremony.

Akin reiterated that Southeastern is a seminary whose core purpose is to spread the faith.

Speaking to the graduates, Akin said: "You get to take the life-changing light of the Gospel of Jesus Christ to those who have value, men for whom Christ died," Akin said.

Once again, even in this article, the mission of the *teaching* is clear, nothing neutral about it. Though the NC prison director is clearer than TDCJ Dir. Collier on "no preaching" or converting, she sat through the commissioning of gospel ministers. Then the RNS article closed, making clear a correction to the NC director's baloney or participation in the scam, quoting from one of the graduates his intentions.

Loren Hammonds, a 43-year-old inmate serving a sentence of life without parole, said that's exactly what he hopes to do. Hammonds, who held his mother's hand as he sat with his parents, shortly after the graduation, said he will be sent to a hospice-care ward at a prison 40 miles from Charlotte where he will offer comfort and companionship to terminally ill men who will spend their final days in a cell bloc.

"I want to give them hope," he said, "and introduce them to the Gospel."

Bread riots in the capital, Petrograd, go unchecked at first, and the police are beaten and killed by mobs. Efforts to put down the violence using the army trigger a mutiny in the numerous reserve regiments housed in the city, who kill their officers and rampage. The anti-Tsarist bourgeois opposition, horrified by the violence, scrambles to declare that it is provisionally taking power, while socialists immediately create a Soviet alternative to undermine it. Meanwhile, Emperor Nikolai II is away at military headquarters and his wife Aleksandra is isolated outside Petrograd, caring for their sick children. Suddenly, the viability of the Russian state itself is called into question.

The Red Wheel has been compared to Tolstoy's War and Peace, for each work aims to narrate the story of an era in a way that elevates its universal significance. In much the same way as Homer's Iliad became the representative account of the Greek world and therefore the basis for Greek civilization, these historical epics perform a parallel role for our modern world. -. Southern Baptist Texan Vol. 21, No. 1 (January 2022), cover "Renew Your Mind" centered in all bold, but no cover article. The issue's theme was mental health with a pretense of homage to psychology. The articles on mental health concerns are as follows. SBT Editor Jayson Larson, "The Battle for Your Mind," (p. 2), was a simple ode to trusting Christ as the "path to mental spiritual health," introducing the theme. Gary Ledbetter, "I Am a Better Pastor when I Am a Better Me," (pp. 4–6), outlined the struggles of two prominent Texas pastors, Danny Forshee of Great Hills Baptist Church in Austin and Byron McWilliams of First Baptist Church in Odessa. Jayson Larson, "We All Walk with a Limp," (pp. 8–9), was a question-answer form with Mike Schumacher, where Larson asked him five (5) questions and he answered about the church leaders and their struggles that he and his crew 14 certified counselors handle, including "500 appointments a month"! He is an associate pastor at Sagemont Church in Houston, and he listed no standard qualifications. McAllen's First Baptist Pastor Chuck Lawless, "5 Ways Pastors Can Manage Their Own Mental Health," (p. 10), including the first being intentionally develop friendships, then prayer group, find a few other believers, take time off, and lastly not to be afraid to see a "Christian counselor," where Lawless is the dean of doctoral studies and vice president of spiritual formation at Southeastern Seminary. Steven Gaither, "Pastor to Pastor: Critical Connections Will Help in Our Battle Against Weariness," (p. 11), closing with "Slow Down to Be with Jesus," "Eat a Meal with a Trusted Friend," and "Be Present and Engaged with Family." Lilly Park, "Come Together," (pp. 12-13), whose hook was, "Counseling leaders say biblical friendships, churches helping each other key to navigating mental health issues," as she presented a few paragraphs from eight other Christian counselors. Park is a professor of biblical

- counseling at SWBTS. Mansfield's First Baptist Pastor Spencer Plumlee, "Pastor, You Don't Have to 'Play Injured," (p 19), where he gives a few standard devotional practices for spiritual and emotional health. They gave a QR code to www.TexanOnline.net/special -reports/mental-spiritual-health/ that give an article on mental health aids, which gave a few articles on what others are doing. See www.TexanOnline.net/print-archive/ where they post all the volumes. A clipped version of this was added to page 5 late in the final publication so it did not make it into the book's bibliography or any of the names into the index. Pretty much confirms a lot of the anti-psychiatry essence, though there were hints of wisdom and professionalism. This appears above, too, in the main bibliography.

Here is the concluding definition by the International Consensus Conference on Improving the Spiritual Dimension of Whole Person Care: The Transformational Role of Compassion, Love, and Forgiveness in Health Care, their third conference, January 13–16, 2013, Geneva, Switzerland, including 41 international leaders in the medical profession.

Spirituality is a dynamic and intrinsic aspect of humanity through which persons seek ultimate meaning, purpose, and transcendence, and experience relationship to self, family, others, community, society, nature, and the significant or sacred. Spirituality is expressed through beliefs, values, traditions, and practices.<sup>2</sup>

If in 2010 when TDCJ leaders and RPD Director Madeline Ortiz had been the least concerned with religion and the *profession* of chaplaincy, they would not have been been at the *same time* killing the entire chaplaincy from its budget with the LBB and signing a contract with the HOTF's Grove Norwood to train psychopathic murderers and rapists to pretend *counsel* some of the most troubled persons on earth in Texas prisons.
