
Jayne cherishes her ancestry studies, working hard on their family tree.

Because of some intrigue Bertis had gotten himself into with a blind date to a very well-to-do daughter in another town, word travelling as it does, that set Jayne's determined virtue into high gear. She would only let Bertis "go steady" with her for one day.

Jayne got a scholarship for twirling and attended SFA. She would become a teacher.

"We dated for a couple years," Bertis said. Then he entered the Navy as an electrician with the Seabees (Seabee.navy.mil). He spent 18 months in Newfoundland.

"We called and talked. I got an enormous phone bill," Bertis quipped. "On August 23, 1961, I asked her to marry me, and she accepted the ring."

But he had two more years to go in the Navy, first to Guantanamo and then to Antarctica.

"We tried to stay warm as we rewired the base at South Pole Station," Bertis said, changing generators from one- to three-phase current, as the base sat upon 10,000 feet of snow, the generators ran everything (SouthPoleStation.com). In October 1962, the ice breakers came in and had to dump their cargo on the ice and skedaddle before the passage closed. Bertis and crew had to transport the fuel barrels and supplies to storage on skids.

Shortly after the Navy, they married in September 1963 and moved around a bit as Bertis changed jobs, mostly in banking.

Jayne worked as a secretary for Citizens Bank officer Lee Feagin. She still gets a kick out of her having to cut the coupons off Imperial Sugar sacks in order for him to get the silverware offered. When Bertis and Jayne got married, Lee gave them a box of silverware he had gotten from the sugar coupons.

Bertis opened Jasper Federal Savings and Loan's first branch in Woodville in the mall where Boykin's Photography resides, then they built a larger office across from the hospital, where the Tax Assessor's office now resides.

Bertis was in the thick of it when the savings and loan industry collapsed in late 1980s.

In between bank jobs, he worked briefly for a car dealer, joking about some of the sleazy tactics. Himself an expert in loans, he smiled at their attempts to make a 22% car loan rate sound like an 8% rate. He moved on to First National Bank Jasper, starting in their car loan department of all things. Then he became a supervisor over their branches.

Jayne retired with 30+ years of teaching under her belt. Bertis has had two heart attacks, in 1990 and 1997, received a pacemaker, and has since regimented his life accordingly.

What advice do they have for younger couples?

Bertis' generally jovial nature turned serious. "You have to work hard. Live right. We made plenty of mistakes." He paused to reflect, then with thankfulness in his voice and a smile, "You have got to have a loving wife."

They have been examples to their two children, too, Bryan and Janet, who followed their parents' careers – son into banking and daughter into teaching.

Bertis and Jayne bought the house in the Campground community in which she and two of her brothers were born. He occasionally works there on the weekends. But Bertis has not retired; he is a vice president of First National Bank Jasper in the Woodville Branch and still loves helping people with their bank needs.

As they returned from Houston on the third Sunday in September, they entered into their 51st year of marriage with many fond memories and several not-so-coincidental turns in the road. Confirming his guidance upon their in many ways, when God finally puts together their "Balance Sheet," doubtlessly the bottom-line will read, "The steps of this couple were ordered by the Lord," and, after all – it has been delightful.
