In the May CLC report, I gave an extended quote from a Heritage Foundation Article (Heritage.org) "The Real Impact of Shariah Law in America," among which was discussed the lawsuit of a Moroccan Muslim

woman who lived with her Moroccan Muslim husband in New Jersey, who beat her repeatedly and claimed such was his "religious" right. In this article, the Muslim author outlines the meaning of the Fourth of July celebrating the American *right* of independence. Here are a couple of quotes:

Independence does not belong more to the White man than it does to the Black man or any other human being. The need for and urge toward independence was established in every human while yet in the wombs of their mothers....



The Quran 2:193 states: "And fight them on, until there is no more

tulmult or oppression, and there prevail justice and faith in G-d. But if they cease, let there be no hostility, except to those who practice oppression." Isn't this the same basis upon which America's independence was founded? America was founded, first and foremost, upon freely establishing "Faith in G-d."...

Al-Islam teaches that the worse form of oppression is false worship [italics his]....

Allah did not allow Prophet Muhammed to force religion on anyone. The Prophet was told to invite them with beautiful teachings to the faith. And Allah established that there is no compulsion in religion.... Independence Day, as exemplified in all the major faiths, is a time for remembering and celebrating the ability for every human being to achieve independence in their mind, body and soul; the ability to be free to serve their Creator.... Real religion practiced (lived out) as dictated by our Creator is specifically designed to give each and every human being a true independence that educates and liberates, to the point where we are free to accept G-d as our Lord. That is our human nature as given to us by Allah (G-d).

The wise men who penned the Declaration ... were blessed to grow into an understanding of this basic and essential need of every human being, and the role of government to be formed around this human need [Author closes with a quote from the Declaration, "We hold these truths ..."].

Maness: Focusing on the author's assumption of a universal "need" for independence, he failed to address the greater need of all people to be "dependent" upon God, even in Islam, to say nothing of Christianity. Historically, the Declaration was less about "need" and vastly more about "rights." Here was a national publication to primarily black American Muslims that it is *publishing* not what many anti-Muslim Christian harbingers allege, when the harbingers quote anything at all. Still, the Muslim author betrays a faulty understanding of "independence" as essentially something that is only available within the Muslim faith, without touching on his own more basic theological dilemma: the very word *Islam* means "submission," and followers (Muslims) are those who "submit" to the will of Allah. The Muslim author's "independence" is far from clean of conflict and is similar to the Calvinist God of providence who grants freedom though God knows and is over every "free-will" action before it happens. What is "free will" and "independence" in this context? For this Muslim, the need for true independence is only obtained *in submission* to Allah, and he struggled to value independence with some patriotic words driven into a gully of "need" that, somehow, Islam has supported for 1,000 years before 1776. He failed (or refused) to grasp that those "wise men" actually meant that independence was a *right* to believe what one's conscience dictated, even to believe in any God or no God, and those "wise men" signed that that *right* was given to them by their creator.
