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κοσμέω, *f. ἡσσος, (κόσμος)* to order, arrange, Hom., esp. (as always in II.), to set an army in array, marshal it, 3. I., 14. 379, etc.; κοσμήσας ἵσπους τε καὶ ἀνέρας 2. 554, etc.; πένταχα κοσμηθέντες marshalled in five bodies, 12. 87; in Od. only once, of hunters, διὰ τὸ τρίχα κοσμηθέντες 9. 157; —also in Med., κοσμηθάμενος πολῆται having arranged his men, II. 2. 806:—so also later, κ. στρατόν Eur. Rhes. 662; (but, κ. συμάχους keep them quiet, lb. 138); τάξεις κεκομημέναι Xen. Cyr. 2. 1, 26, cf. Plat. Phaedr. 247 A; τάξις πλεύναις ἐκεκομέναιο Hdt. 9. 31. 2. generally, to arrange, prepare, δόρπον ἐκόμει Od. 7. 13; δεῖπνον κοσμ. Pind. N. 1. 32; τραπέσαι Xen. Cyr. 8. 2, 6, etc.:—so also, κ. δοιδήν h. Hom. 6. 59; ἔργα Hes. Op. 304; εἰς τάφον λέβητα κοσμεῖ Soph. El. 1401. II. to order, rule, govern, Hdt. 1. 59, Soph. Aj. 1103; τὰ ἄλλα ἐκκοσμεῖσθαι of Hdt. 1. 100, cf. Plat. Phaed. 98 A:—hence, τὰ κοσμούμενα commands, *laws*, Id. Ant. 677:—κεκομημένος well-ordered, orderly, ταπεῖνος καὶ κεκ. Plat. Legg. 716 A, cf. Gorg. 504 A. 2. in Crete, to be *Cosmos*, rule as such (v. κόσμος iv), Arist. Pol. 2. 10, 10, Polyb. 23. 15, I. III. to deck, adorn, dress, esp. of women, h. Hom. 5. 11, 12, Hes. Op. 72, Th. 573; χρυσῷ κοσμηθέσαι h. Hom. Ven. 65: also, κοσμεῖν κ. πανοπλίη Hdt. 4. 180, cf. Pind. I. 1. 27, etc.; and often in Med., κοσμέσαι τὰ κεφαλά to adorn their heads, Hdt. 7. 209; κοσμεῖσθαι σῶμα δόπιοι Eur. Phoen. 1359; etc. 2. metaph. to adorn, embellish, λόγους Eur. Med. 576; τραγικὸν λήπον Ar. Ran. 1005, cf. 1027; λόγον ἐνρυθμίας Isocr. 87 E; αὐτὸν λόγους Plat. Lys. 196 B; ἐπὶ τὸ μέσον κ. Thuc. 1. 21; τὸν τὴν ἐκείνου ἀρέτην κοσμήσοντα (in speaking), Dem. 321. 14. 3. to honour, pay honour to, τάφον Soph. Ant. 396; νέκυαν Eur. Tro. 1147; κ. καὶ τίμαι Xen. Cyr. 1. 3, 3:—of persons, to adorn, be an honour to, πόλιν Theogn. 941; νᾶσον εὐκλέα Pind. N. 6. 78; cf. Eur. Meleag. 4; Thuc. 2. 42. IV. in Pass. to be assigned or ascribed to, belong to, just like τελέειν εἰς . . . εἰς Πέρσας ἐκεκομέναιο Hdt. 6. 41, cf. 3. 91. (V. sub κομέω.)

κόσμημα, *ατος, τό*, an ornament, decoration, esp. in dress, Xen. Cyr. 7. 3, 7, Luc. etc.; τὰ πολέμου κοσμήματα Plat. Legg. 956 A.

κόσμησται, *εως, ἢ*, an ordering, adorning, ταῖς τῇς ψυχῆς τάξεις τε καὶ κοσμήσεις Plat. Gorg. 504 D, cf. Criti. 117 B.

κόσμητρα, *ἡ*, fem. from sq., Orph. H. 9. 8:—name of a female magistrate at Ephesus, Inscr. in Pocock. p. 37.

κόσμητρή, *ηρος, δ*, =sq., Epigr. ap. Aeschin. 80. 22, Plut. Cim. 7. 2. κοσμητρίον, *τό*, an ornament-case, Paus. 2. 7. 5. II. =κόσμητρον, Hesych.

κόσμητής, *οὐ, δ*, (κοσμέω) an orderer, arranger, πολέμου Epigr. ap. Aeschin. 80. 24. 2. at Athens, a magistrate in charge of the Gymnasia, Teles ap. Stob. p. 535. 21, Inscr. II. an adorer, Xen. Cyr. 8. 8, 20.

κόσμητικός, *ἡ, δν*, skilled in decorating: ἡ-κή (sc. τέχην), the art of dress and ornament, Plat. Soph. 277 A, Polit. 282 A. Adv. -κώς, Hieroc. in Phot. Bibl. 465. 9.

κόσμητός, *ἡ, δν*, well-ordered, trim, πρασιά Od. 7. 127.

κόσμητρια, *ἡ*, =κόσμητρα, Hesych., Epiphani. I. 973 D.

κόσμητρον, *τρο*, a broom, Schol. Ar. Pax 59, Suid.

κόσμητρω, *ορος, δ*, poet. for κοσμητής, one who marshals an army, a commander, leader, Αἴαντε διώ, κοσμήτρος λαῶν II. 1. 16, etc., cf. Od. 18. 152; a guide, director, Ap. Rh.

κοσμαῖος, *α, ον, (κόσμος v)* of the size of the universe, Democr. ap. Stob. El. I. 348.

κοσμίζω, to clean, Hesych. s. v. σαρῶ.

κοσμικός, *ἡ, δν, (κόσμος v)* of the world or universe, τὰ κοσμικὰ πάντα Arist. Phys. 2. 4; ἡ διάταξις Plut. 2. 119 F; κ. ὀχλήσεις Luc. Paras. 11. II. of this world, earthly, N. T.: hence worldly, evil, ἐπιτυμέις Ib. 2. secular, lay, opp. to clerical, Eccl.:—Adv. -κώς, Ib.

κόσμον, *τό*, Dim. from κόσμος, Diod. Ed. 2. p. 512, Plut. 2. 141 E; τὰς ἀρχὰς κ. the insignia of office, Diod. Exc. p. 616; κ. βασιλικά, στρατηγικά Plut. Demetr. 45, Anton. 17.

κόσμος, *α, ον, also ον, ον, (κόσμος)* well-ordered, moderate, δωδάνη Plat. Rep. 560 D; οἰκηται Id. Criti. 112 C. 2. of persons, orderly, well-behaved, discreet, δίκαιος καὶ σοφοὶ καὶ κ. Ar. Plut. 89; κ. καὶ σύφρων Lys. 163. 22; κ. καὶ εὔκολος Plat. Rep. 329 D; κ. καὶ φρόνιμος Id. Phaed. 108 A; κ. ἐν διάτῃ Rep. 408 A; πρὸς τὸν θεόν Id. Symp. 193 A; οἱ κοσμάτατοι φύσαι Ib. Rep. 564 E:—of a patient, quiet, Hipp. Acut. 395:—often in Oratt., of honest, orderly citizens, Lys. 175. 22, etc.; τοὺς πολέμας κοσμωτέρους τοιεῦν Isocr. 398 C:—also, modest, Xen. Mem. 3. I. 14:—τὸ κ. decorum, Soph. El. 872, Plat. Legg. 802 E.—So too Adv. -ιώς, regularly, decently, Ar. Plut. 709, 978; κ. βιῶν Lysias 97. 2; κοσμώτερον βεβιωκέναι Isocr. Antid. § 174; —ἀτατα Lys. 96. 39. II. δ κόσμος, =κοσμίκος, κοσμοπολίτης, Plut. 2. 600 F. 2. κόσμος IV, Böckh Inscr. 2. 405.

κοσμότης, *ητος, ἡ, propriety, decorum, orderly behaviour*, Ar. Plut. 564, Plat. Polit. 307 A, etc.; κ. καὶ σωφροσύνη Plat. Gorg. 508 A; opp. to ἀκολασία, Arist. Eth. N. 2. 8, 8; v. sub κομψότης.

κοσμογονία, *ἡ*, the creation or origin of the world, Clem. Al. 564; name of a work by Parmenides, Plat. 2. 756 E:—dub. forms κοσμογένεια, γενία occur in Clem. Al. ib. 810, Theodoret.

κοσμογόνος, *ον, creating the world*, Synes. 345 C.

κοσμογράφια, *ἡ, description of the world*, κ. καὶ γεωγραφία Clem. Al. Strom. p. 757.

κοσμογράφος, *ον, describing the world*, Jo. Gaz. Mund. Tab. 2. 3.

κοσμοδιστής, *ον, δ*, lord of the world, Eust. Opusc. 162. 67.

κοσμοδιοκτητός, *ἡ, δν*, governing the world, Stob. Edi. 2. 66.

κοσμοθέτης, *ον, δ*, Regulator of the world, Greg. Naz.

κοσμοκίντρος, *ον, moved or moving in the world*, Pisid. Opif. 216.

κοσμοκόμητης, *ον, δ*, dressing the hair, κτεῖ Anth. P. 6. 247.

κοσμοκρατορίκες, *ἡ, δν*, world-governing, Euseb.

κοσμοκράτωρ, *ορος, δ*, lord of the world, Orph. H. 3. 3:—in Ecc., of evil spirits, from Ep. Ephes. 6. 12. [δ]

κοσμοκτίστωρ, *ον, δ*, creator of the world, Byz.

κοσμολότης, *ον, δ*, destroyer of the world, Greg. Naz. 2. 87 B; so, κοσμολέθρος, Id. Pisid. Opif. 340.

κοσμολογικός, *ἡ, δν*, touching physical philosophy, Dion. Areop.

κοσμολόγης, *εις, raging through the world*, Or. Sib. 5. p. 618.

κοσμοπαθής, *εις, easily impressed by worldly things*, Eust. Opusc. 234. 89.

κοσμοπλαστέω, to form, create the world, Philo I. 437.

κοσμοπλάστης, *ον, δ*, framer of the world, Philo I. 329, 526.

κοσμοπληθής, *εις, filling the world*, καταλυσία Maccab.

κοσμοπλόκος, *ον, holding together the world*, Anth. P. 9. 525.

κοσμοποιός, *ον, to make the world*, Plut. 2. 719 C, 877 C. 2.

κοσμοποιός, *ον, to make a system or theory of the world*, Arist. Metaph. 13. 3, Coel. 3, Plut.; κ. τούς δάστέρας to assert them to be worlds, Plut. 2. 888 F.

κοσμοποιητής, *ον, δ*, creator of the world, Herm. in Stob. Edi. I. 976:—

κοσμοποιητικός, *ἡ, δν*, of or for creation, Philo.

κοσμοποιΐα, *ἡ, the creation*, Arist. Metaph. I. 4. 5:—title of a work by Empedocles, Id. Nat. Auct. 2. 4. 5.

κοσμοποιός, *ον, making the world*, Parmenid. ap. Plut. 2. 884 E.

κοσμόπολις, *δ*, a magistrate among the Locrians, Polyb. 12. 16, 9, Böckh Inscr. 2. 428; cf. κύρως IV.

κοσμοπολίτης, *ού, δ*, a citizen of the world, Diog. L. 6. 63; (in Luc. Vit. Auct. 8, κόσμου πολίτης):—fem. πολίτις, Philo I. 657.

κοσμοπρεπής, *εις, suitable for the universe*, Stob.

κόσμος, *ον, δ*, (prob. from κομέω) order, κατὰ κόσμον in order, duly, εὖ κατὰ κόσμον II. 10. 472, etc.; opp. to οὐ κατὰ κόσμον, shamefully, 8. 179; to μάψ ἀτάρ οὐ κατὰ κόσμον, II. 2. 214: so, κόσμῳ καθίειν to sit in order, Od. 13. 77, cf. Hdt. 8. 67; οὐ κόσμῳ .. πλευρόμεθα II. 12. 225; κόσμῳ θεῖναι Hdt. 2. 52., 7. 36, etc.; κόσμῳ φέρειν to bear becomingly, Pind. P. 3. 147: esp., οὐδεὶν κόσμῳ in no sort of order, Hdt. 9. 59; φεύγειν, άπένειν οὐδεὶν κόσμῳ 3. 13. 8. 60, 3, etc.; ἀτάκτως καὶ οὐδεὶν κ. Thuc. 3. 108, cf. Aesch. Pers. 400; so, οὐδένα κόσμον Hdt. 9. 69; opp. to οὐ κόσμῳ, 8. 86; or, ἐν κόσμῳ, Plat. Symp. 223 B. 2. good order, good behaviour, decency, Aesch. Ag. 521; discipline, Dem. 300. 19; opp. to δικομία, Soph. Fr. 726. 3. form, fashion, ἴτιον κόσμον δέσιον δουρατέον Od. 8. 492, cf. Hdt. 3. 32:—a set form or order, Hdt. I. 99: of states, order, government, metacriostēs τῶν κ. Thuc. 4. 76, cf. 8. 48, 67; μένειν ἐν τῷ διληγαρχικῷ κ. 8. 72, etc. —esp. of the Spartan constitution, Hdt. 1. 65, cf. Clear. ap. Ath. 681 C. II. an ornament, decoration, embellishment, dress, esp. of women, Lat. mundus muliebris, II. 14. 187, Hes. Op. 76, Plat. Rep. 373 C, etc.; of a horse, II. 4. 145; of men, Hdt. 3. 123. 9. 2, 7, etc., and Att.: γλαυκόχροα κόσμοις ἔλαται, of an olive-wreath, Pind. O. 3. 24, cf. 8. 109, P. 2. 19, etc.; κ. κυνῶν Xen. Cyn. 6. 1:—in plur. ornaments, Aesch. Ag. 1271, Isocr. 21 B, Plat., etc.:—of persons, etc., σὺν ἐμοὶ μέγιστος κ. ἔστι Xen. Cyr. 6. 4, 3, cf. Arist. Eth. N. 4. 3, 16: of ornaments of speech, Isocr. 192 D, Arist. Rhet. 3. 7, 2, Poet. 21. 2., 22. 4, such as epithets, 2. metaph. honour, credit, Pind. N. 2. 12, I. 6 (5). 101; κόσμον φέρει τούτῳ it does one credit, Hdt. 8. 60, 142; γύναι, γυναικί κόσμον ἡ σιτηρη Soph. Aj. 203; κ. τούτῳ ἔστιν ἐμοὶ Ar. Nub. 914; οἱ κόσμοι ἡν καλῶν τούτῳ δράμ Thuc. 1. 5; ἐν κόσμῳ καὶ τιμῇ εἶναι τοι Dem. 1400. 13:—ἀδυμελῆ κόσμοις κελαδεῖν to sing sweet songs of praise, Piud. O. 11 (10). 14. III. a ruler, regulator, title of the chief magistrate in Crete, Arist. Pol. 2. 10, 6, etc.: v. Müller Dor. 3. 8; cf. κοσμέω II, κοσμητής 3, κοσμήτηρα.

IV. the world or universe, from its perfect order and arrangement, opp. to the indigesta moles of Chaos, first in the Philosophy of Pythagoras, Plut. Plac. Phil. 2. 1, Diog. L. 8. 48 (ubi v. Menag.); and it is so used by the Pythagoreans Philolaos (in Stob. Ed. Phys. I. 23), Callicrat. (ap. Stob. t. 85. 17), etc.: hence it passed into the language of the philosophic poets Xenophanes, Parmenides, and Empedocles; and was then adopted by all writers on natural philosophy, as Plat. Tim. 27 A, 28 B, 29 A, 32 C, etc. The Stoics used it also of the *anima mundi*, and of the universe as itself divine, διὸς. Κύρος ἐμψυχον καὶ λογικόν Posidon. ap. Diog. L. 7. 139, cf. Plat. Tim. 30 B.—Sometimes it includes the Earth, sometimes is used only of the firmament, γῆς ἀνάστης τῆς ἱδὲ κόσμου κειμένης Isocr. 78 C; οἱ περὶ τὴν γῆν δόται κ. Arist. Meteor. I. 2. in plur.; sometimes of the several stars or worlds, opp. to τὸ πᾶν (the Universe), Anaxag. Fr. pp. 89, 93, 120, Plut. 2. 879 B, 888 F.—Metaph. man is called βραχὺς κ. Philo 2. 155, Galen.—In Alexandr. Greek for the known world (ἡ οἰκουμένη), Böckh Inscr. I. No. 334, 1306, Ev. Math. 16. 26: and for
