Psalm 1:1-6 – Tree Planted by Streams

¹ Blessed is the one ... or Happy is the one ...

From TOD*, Thomas Watson, Saints Spiritual Delight, 1660:

Whole Psalm ... may not unfitly be entitled, the Psalm of Psalms, for it contains in it the very pith and quintessence of Christianity.

What Jerome saith on St. Paul's epistles, the same may I say of this Psalm; it is short as to the composure, but full of length and strength as to the matter.

This Psalm carries blessedness in the frontpiece;

it begins where we all hope to end:

it may well be called a Christian's Guide, for it discovers the quicksands where the wicked sink down in perdition, and the firm ground on which the saints tread to glory.



The first verse seems to set the course for the whole

From TOD*, Sir Richard Baker (1568-1645), politician, historian, author of *Chronicle of the Kings of England*, said

Verse 1. Where the word *blessed* is hung out as a sign, we may be sure that we shall find a godly man within.

You know, like the Beatitudes, "Blessed" can be "Happy"
We Christians naturally add a tad more to mere "Happy"
Christians add that "Blessed" include God's Blessing
If "Blessed"—you are happy because of God favor



Psalm 1:1-6 - Tree Planted by Streams

On the whole Psalm 1 ...

From T.O.D.*, Puritan John Trapp (1601-69) said in 1660:

Verse 1. The psalmist saith more to the point about true happiness in this short Psalm than any one of the philosophers, or all of them put together;

they did but beat the bush,

God hath here put the bird into our hand.

More than just a contrast between the GOOD and the BAD

Psalm 1 ... places the Meditator of God's Word at the helm

and places the evil as chaff ... next to dust ...


Psalm 1 is short enough to view the whole at the start




Psalm 1:1-6 - Tree Planted by Streams

- ¹ Blessed is the one who does not walk in step with the wicked or stand in the way that sinners take or sit in the company of mockers,
- ² but whose delight is in the law of the LORD, and who meditates on his law day and night.
- ³ That person is like a tree planted by streams of water, which yields its fruit in season and whose leaf does not wither—whatever they do prospers.
- ⁴ Not so the wicked! They are like chaff that the wind blows away. ⁵ Therefore the wicked will not stand in the judgment, nor sinners in the assembly of the righteous.
 - ⁶ For the LORD watches over the way of the righteous, but the way of the wicked leads to destruction.









"Psalms" - means "Hymns of Praise"

"Psalms" comes from Latin from Greek translating Hebrew

Book of Psalms is a Hymnbook ... a book of SONGS

Dates: Moses d. 1571 B.C. (or 1271) to Nehemiah c. 444 B.C.

OVER = 1,000 yrs




Whaaaattt? - Imprecatory?

Imprecatory asks for judgment, calamity, or curses on one's enemies

Imprecatory asks for judgment, calamity, or curses on the perceived enemies of God

As in Psalm 69:24,

"Pour out Your indignation on them, and let Your burning anger overtake them"

Ready for a perhaps WORST verse in the ENTIRE Bible?

Psalm 137:9, "Happy shall he be, that taketh and dasheth thy little ones against the stones."

Don't take 137 out of the context of Condemning Babylon

STILL – "Happy?" – "BLESSED?" – at Killing Babies??

You'll be "Happy" to know 137 is NOT in this series

Psalms – the Enchanted Forest Immediately ... you see 150 Psalms in FIVE BOOKS Not so obvious ... "FIVE" is arbitrary i.e., No discernable reason for division into FIVE FIVE divisions ... NOT by author, content or theme Do take a look at www.FiveBooks.com ... monumental Under a 100+ topics and reader driven, they are putting together LISTS of the Five Best Books on everything Under the topic "Religion" ... 20+ lists of Five top choices Five Best Christian Books, which several of us would not 5 on Christianity – 5 on Jesus – 5 on Atheism 5 on God – 5 on Islam ... not the best choices

Though the "FIVE" is arbitrary on content

There are "Psalms" in some of the Prophets

One reason for the "FIVE" is to MIRROR the Pentateuch's, or Torah's Five Books

Toroah: Gen-Deut = God's Revelation to His People

Psalm's Five: Humankind's Fivefold Response in Praise

Intriguing ... how each BOOK ENDS

Book 1 - 1-41

41:13, Praise be to the LORD, the God of Israel, from everlasting to everlasting. Amen & Amen.

Book 2 - 42-72

72:18-19, Praise be to the LORD God, the God of Israel, who alone does marvelous deeds. Praise be to his glorious name forever; may the whole earth be filled with his glory. Amen & Amen.

Book 2 ends, w 72:20
This concludes the prayers of David son of Jesse.

Book 3 - 73-89

89:52, Praise be to the LORD forever! Amen & Amen

Book 4 - 90-106

106:48, Praise be to the LORD, the God of Israel, from everlasting to everlasting. Let all the people say, "Amen!" Praise the LORD.

Book 5 - 107-150


150:6, Let everything that has breath praise the LORD. Praise the LORD.

Hallelujah

Hallelujah begins & ends

Psalms 146-150, all five psalms *Plus, it begins 106, 111-113, 135*

Remember YHWH = LORD
Pronounced Yah-Way

"Hallelujah" is a contraction of

and

Hallu = Praise You Yah = YHWH

Hallu-Yah Hebrew yields English

YHWH in Hebrew - read R to L



Hallelujah = Praise YHWH

Hallelujah = Praise You the LORD

Hallelujah

Hallelujah begins & ends

Psalms 146-150, all five psalms

Plus, it begins 106, 111-113, 135

Hallu-Yah relates to Hallelujah in Greek

Greek Alleluia is found in Rev. 19:1, 3, 4, 6

LXX – for 70 – stands for Old Testament translated in Greek by 72 legendary Jewish scholars who translated the 5 books

Tradition says Ptolemy II (309–246 BC) sponsored

Over the next 100+ years, the rest of the O.T translated

By Augustine of Hippo (354–430 CE) ... called in Latin Septuaginta

then in English as Septuagint or simpler LXX



YHWH in Hebrew - read R to L

Hallelujah

What is interesting, intriguing even

The Septuagint or LXX ...

Added a title and authors ...

Haggai & Zechariah



YHWH in Hebrew - read R to L

Some think verse 3, "Put not your trust in princes" refers to Cyrus being persuaded to withdraw orders to rebuild temple

That Psalms 146 may have been written AFTER captivity ...

Israelites – on return from captivity, rebuilt 2nd Temple under great duress, weeping over the loss of former glory


Judaism takes off and develops to N.T. times ...

Hallelujah

Intriguing how Septuagint or LXX ... added Haggai & Zechariah

Psalms 146 was used AFTER captivity ... by the time of the Septuagint or LXX

Sigmund Mowinkel (1884–1965)



Norwegian biblical Professor Sigmund Mowinkel (1884–1965)

Taught at University of Oslo from 1917 to his retirement in 1954 in his unsurpassed *The Psalms in Israel's Worship* (Trans. 1962)

He noted that the Book of Psalms – our Enchanted Forest of 150

During 2nd Temple period, ONLY these 150 were used, NO OTHERS

Even when a new festival was added, an early psalm was reused with a new meaning

Sigmund Mowinkel (1884–1965), The *Psalms in Israel's Worship* (Trans. D. R. Ap-Thomas; Abingdon Press, 1967; 1st 1962, 2 vv); v2, 202.

Hallel Psalms

Hallel = Praise You

Psalms 113-118 are the "Hallel Psalms"

These are also called "Egyptian Hallel"

For they were chanted in 2nd Temple as Passover Lamb was slain and other festivals



YHWH in Hebrew - read R to L

Psalms 113-118 chanted vs. by vs. as the people said, Hallelujah


Egyptian Hallel at Passover ... the hymn used in Matthew 26:30

When they had sung a hymn, they went out to the Mount of Olives.

Hallel Psalms used during Passover some believe since 5th c. B.C.

"Great Hallel" - Psalm 113-136 - Evening of Passover Supper

Psalm 136 or 135-136 called the "Great Hallel"



Though the "FIVE" is arbitrary on content

They are not ALL of the Psalms, as some of the Prophets include others ...

Book 1 ... Davidic Psalms, 3-41, some see 2-41 Davidic

Psalm 1 ... could very well have been by David too ...

Psalm 1 ... simplistic beauty similar to All-time-Favorite Psalm 23

Book 1 1-41 Jehovah 272x ... Elohim 15x YHWH = Jehovah = Lord


Book 2 42-72 Jehovah 43x ... Elohim 200x

Book 3 73-89 mostly time of Hezekiah

Book 4 90-106 mostly ritual, Jehovah used exclusively

Book 5 107-150 – 15 Davidic, Jehovah *ALMOST* exclusively





Musical Notation developed throughout the Dark Ages

Primarily through the church ...

Charting Melody but not rhythm

Mostly, the only one who could read it was someone already knew it ...

In Asia and India ... they had some crude notation not any better or worse than the West

Modern Staff Notation arose in Classical Europe

circa A.D. 1600 and following

Modern Staff Notation today ...

Universal Language of Music ...



Music from an English Missal of 14th Century

Music in the Bible?

Gen. 4, Jubal, son of Lamech was what?

Inventor of Musical Instruments

After the Flood, first mention is Gen. 31:27, Laban to Jacob ...


Why did you run off secretly and deceive me? Why didn't you tell me, so I could send you away with joy and singing to the *MUSIC* of timbrels and harps?

1 Kings1, Music used in crowning kings

Shophar is often translated as trumpet

See also the cymbal, 10-string harp, timbrel, pipe





In the Book of Psalms ... 150 in all

116 Psalms superscriptions, or special descriptions

In those 116, 100 have names, like "David"

73 Psalms have "David" ... yet, hear ye, hear ye

While all 73 might have been authored by David

Many may have been "TO" or "FOR" David – or ALL by him

Likewise, many OTHER Psalms could have been written by David

FACT: "to, for, by David" ... could have been OTHER authors too

2 Sam. 23:1 - David, "Sweet psalmist of Israel"

73 Davidic Psalms 3 to 9, 11 to 32, 34 to 41, 68 to 70, 51 to 65, 101, 86, 103, 108 to 110, 124, 122, 133, 131 and 138 to 145.

Intriguing – The Great Psalms Scroll 1946 the first of 972 Dead Sea Scrolls in Qumran 1956, 10 yrs later, Great Psalms Scroll in Cave 11 **Great Psalms Scroll praises King David's works** Astounding—David authored 3,600 psalms plus 364 for each day, 52 weeklies, 30 for sacrifices Boldly claiming David authored upward of 4,050!



Intriguing – No Surprise then

David - means "Beloved"

There is only one David in the Bible

The shepherd, slayer of Goliath, King David

No other person in the Bible in the named David

Only one "Beloved" in the Bible ...





One last observation of the Whole Forest ...

Psalm 1:1 OPENS w: ¹ Blessed is the one who does not walk

Psalm 150:6 CLOSES w: ⁶ Praise the LORD.

The 150 Psalms cover a load of Religious Experience


Prayer ... Praise ... Divine Attributes ... Affliction

Book of Psalms, all FIVE BOOKS ... have another Grand Distinction
They were INCLUDED in the *Hagiographa* = Jewish Holy Writings
In the Holy Writings of the Jews centuries BEFORE our Bible
Luke 24, after Jesus appeared at Emmaus ... two go to Jerusalem. *Luke leaves out the appearance at Galilee seashore.*

In Jerusalem, Jesus appears to the Disciples ... explains Scripture Luke implies long teaching before the Ascension in Bethany

Luke 24:44, He said to them, "This is what I told you while I was still with you: Everything must be fulfilled that is written about me in the LAW OF MOSES, the PROPHETS and the PSALMS."

Book of Psalms - Scripture BEFORE our Scriptures



¹ Blessed is the one who does not walk in step with the wicked or stand in the way that sinners take or sit in the company of mockers,

First off ... we are in the land of metaphor

Simile is something "like" ... bright as the star < simile

Metaphor IS the thing ... His star rose high < metaphor

does not WALK ... STAND ... or SIT





In Virgil's Aeneid (c. 20 B.C.), after the Greeks sack Troy

Aeneas grabs his father Anchises & son Ascanius

Aeneas CARRIES his fa

Carries them on his BA

Aeneas is a Trojan Herd

An ancestor of Remus

am of Rome

Aeneas, his father & son, and a few others are among a small number escaping the Greek slaughter of Troy

Aeneas and entourage flee in a boat ...
have a time finding a place to settle

This *delight* which the prophet here speaks of is the *ONLY DELIGHT* that neither blushes nor looks pale;

the ONLY DELIGHT that gives a repast without an after reckoning;

the *ONLY DELIGHT* that stands in construction with all tenses; and like AENEAS, carries his parents upon his back.

There are burdens ... that are heavy burdens ...

But we would rather **DIE** than leave them **behind**

Burden NOT too heavy ... because LOVE carries all

Taxing limbs, but rather DIE than leave it behind


Truly not that hard to conceive ... for a Christian Spurgeon said,

He ... carries it with him all day long; and in the night-watches, when sleep forsakes his eyelids, he museth upon the Word of God.

In the day of his prosperity he sings psalms out of the Word of God,

and in the night of his affliction

he comforts himself with *promises* out of the same book.




In TOD*, Joseph Caryl (1602-73), English minister ejected from church, went independent, said in 1647, It may be ... at once reading ... we see little ... as Elijah's servant went once, and saw nothing; therefore he was commanded to look seven times. "What now?" says the prophet,

"I see a cloud rising, like a man's hand;" and ... surface of the heavens was covered with clouds.

So you may look lightly upon a Scripture and see nothing; meditate often upon it, and there you shall see a light, like the light of the sun.







6 Conclusion - Lord Watches Way of Righteous

⁶ For the LORD watches over the way of the righteous, but the way of the wicked leads to destruction.

Notice the Present Tense, WATCHES or IS KNOWING .:

Spurgeon said, "Though it may be often in mist and darkness, yet the Lord knoweth it.

If it be in the clouds and tempest of affliction, he understandeth it."

Does not mean you are perfect ... you without blemish ...

Does mean ... God Knows ... God Watches



6 Conclusion – Lord Watches Way of Righteous
