Job knows something of this: see the same word in Job 16:16, KJV, saying so poetically, ¹⁶ My face is foul with weeping, and


on my eyelids is the shadow of death;

David could be referring to a PLACE of dire peril A place of danger ... sheep are prone to panic 2013 Idaho—two wolves came to a herd sheep 176 sheep died ... yet only 10 sheep were killed by the two wolves PANIC caused the sheep to trample each other and most died from suffocation!
