

Who, at some point, has NOT begged such? **Anyone? ... If anyone has NOT prayed such:** God Bless that Blessedly PEACEFUL Life_ Most of us – with a few years – have PRAYED it ¹ LORD, I call on You. HURRY to help me. Spurgeon* so kindly opines on Psalm 141:

Its meaning lies so deep as to be in places exceedingly obscure,

yet even upon its surface it has dust of gold.


In its commencement the psalm is lighted up with the evening glow as the incense rises to heaven;

then comes a night of language whose meaning we cannot see;


and this gives place to morning light in which our eyes are unto the Lord.










Listen to my voice when I call on You. ² May my prayer be set before You as incense, the raising of my hands as the evening offering. And because of the latter part of v. 2 Some have said Psalm 141 was designed for Vespers That is: Sunset Evening Prayers in Jewish life Also seen in the Orthodox, Western and Eastern Catholic, Anglican, and Lutheran liturgies



O.T. scholars Keil & Delitzsch
see a hint in Psalm 141 for David fleeing his son Absalom
Remember that the Psalter, all 150 Psalms
are divided into Five Books ...

The last Two Books – Book 4 and Book 5 – mostly historical

Others see perhaps
David's pursuit by King Saul

That is ... from DAVID's perspective

To have NEVER ... ever ... been PURSUED

I am GUESSING ... surely and truly

That 99% of us here today ...

Therefore and because of America the Beautiful

How very LOVELY it is to be

SAFE ... WARM ... SECURE ...

How very COZY it is to be

FREE ... PROTECTED ... and ... ALIVE!



King David ... could not even DREAM of us David knew NOTHING of our lifestyle today NOTHING ...

Pericles, Roman copy after a Greek original from ca. 430 BC.

David lived 500 years before the Golden Age of Greece and the first democracy ... which did not take

Three millennia before the GREAT experiment jelled into a Revolution for Inalienable Rights – 1776

Over 200 more years before Civils Rights came full circle into the 1960s

And TODAY we still struggle

How can we RELATE to King David's flight

Civil War ... and David is hunted by his own SON—Absalom

Absalom ... means "Father of Peace"

Son to his wife Maachah, daughter of Talmai, King of Geshur

2 Samuel 14:25: In all Israel there was not a man so highly praised for his handsome appearance as Absalom. From the top of his head to the sole of his foot there was no blemish in him.

We also need to look briefly as Psalm 141's ... ahhh

If as O.T. scholars Keil & Delitzsch see a hint
David is fleeing from Absalom or another ...
Or from whoever, King Saul or the naysayers ...
Maybe 141 reflected on MANY times David was hunted
Begging for help ... Then David says ...

³ LORD, set up a guard for my mouth; keep watch at the door of my lips.

It is NOT the first time David asks such for his MOUTH In another Psalm of David, 39:2

I was speechless and quiet; I kept silent, even from speaking good, and my pain intensified.

In still another Psalm of David, 34:13

Keep your tongue from evil and your lips from deceitful speech.

Oh, we have much about the tongue in N.T., too

Begging for help ... Then David says in Psalm 141

³ LORD, set up a guard for my mouth; keep watch at the door of my lips.

O.T. scholars Keil & Delitzsch OPENED this for me:

David, the betrayed one, requires caution in speaking; and the consciousness of having sinned ... against God ... stood in the way of any outspoken self-vindication.



Of course Spurgeon* has a wise word, too,

David feels that with all his own watchfulness he may be surprised into sin,

and so he begs the Lord himself to keep him.

When Jehovah sets the watch the city is well guarded....

In times of persecution by ungodly men we are peculiarly liable to speak hastily, or evasively, and therefore we should be specially anxious to be preserved....

How condescending is the Lord!

We are ennobled by being door keepers for him, and yet he deigns to be a door keeper for us.

Spurgeon* continues

Incline not my heart to any evil thing.

It is equivalent to the petition,

"Lead us not into temptation."...

The Psalmist is here careful of his heart.

He who holds the heart is lord of the man:

but if the tongue and the heart are under God's care

ALL IS SAFE.





With a tongue guarded, David asks YHWH asks YHWH a unique protection

⁴ Do not let my heart turn to any evil thing or wickedly perform reckless acts with men who commit sin.

Do not let me feast on their delicacies.

Oppressed ... on the run ... NOT A CRIMINAL

Not a criminal ... but THE anointed KING

Sweet Psalmist of Israel with a checkered past

In FOUR psalms ... he SANG about his PURSUERS



Interestingly, vv. 5-7 haven't been preserved well

i.e., the Hebrew of vv. 5-7 is not CLEAR or consistent making a clear translation difficult

⁵ Let the righteous one strike me;

it is an act of faithful love; let him rebuke me;

it is oil for my head; let me not refuse it.


Even now my prayer is against the evil acts of the wicked.

Whhhaaatt? ... Did I hear that right?

Let the "righteous one strike me"?

What an odd turn that is ...

NO WONDER the experts have trouble.



Spurgeon* weighs in on v. 5 eloquently

He prefers the bitters of gracious company to the dainties of the ungodly.

He would rather be smitten by the righteous than feasted by the wicked....

When the ungodly smile upon us their flattery is cruel; when the righteous smite us their faithfulness is kind.

Sometimes godly men rap hard; they do not merely hint at evil, but hammer at it

Fools resent reproof; wise men endeavour to profit by it.



Spurgeon* continues

Oil breaks no heads, and rebuke does no man any harm ...

reproof when fitly taken sweeten and renew the heart.

Many a man has had his head broken at the feasts of the wicked,

but none at the table of a true hearted reprover.

The oil of flattery is not excellent ... head breaking and heart breaking attend the anointings of the riotous ...

Gracious men never grow wrathful with candid friends so as to harbour an ill feeling against them



Once again, the Hebrew of vv. 5-7 is not CLEAR and hard to make a clear translation difficult

The latter part of v. 5 is hard to grapple with

Even now my prayer is against the evil acts of the wicked.

PRAYER against the wicked ... that is easy!

But we are NOT sure that's an accurate interpretation

Spurgeon* goes after the PRAYER itself so neatly:

Set a bird free from a cage, and it will sing you its thanks as it speeds forth into the air ...





Spurgeon* continues on prayer for "others"

I say it is a natural instinct of the new-born believer to begin to intercede for others,

and this instinct continues with him throughout life.

It is one of the things that he must do,


it is a pleasure to him to do it,

it would be impossible for him utterly to cease from it,

for the indwelling Spirit in his bosom maketh intercession for the saints according to the will of God.

And, brethren, as it is an instinct of the heaven born nature,

so it is a law of the elect household.

Goes on in these hard-to-translate vv. 5-7

vv. 6-7 are similar in most translations
Yet, experts agree: meaning is not clear or easy.



3-7 The Requests – LORD—Watch Door of My Lips
In Chronicles 25:12, King Amaziah of Judah
Men of Judah captured another 10,000 alive

and took them to the top of a rock and threw them down from the top of the rock, and they were all dashed to pieces.

Amaziah reigned over Judah 796-792 B.C.

His son Uzziah reigned with dad for a long time, then reigned himself for 52 more years – a good King

Uzziah did the priests' work and God gave him leprosy

Uzziah had leprosy the rest of his life ...

Rough ... very rough back then ...



3-7 The Requests – LORD—Watch Door of My Lips
What is striking is the word "pleasing"

6 When their rulers ... off the sides of a cliff,

When their rulers ... off the sides of a cliff, the people will listen to my words, for they are PLEASING.

What does that mean?

Off the cliff ... hear words ... and they are PLEASED?

PLEASED perhaps at the "orders" ... who knows?

And the next is as HARD to connect:

⁷ As when one plows and breaks up the soil, turning up rocks, so our bones have been scattered at the *mouth of Sheol*.

The experts agree: meaning is not clear or easy.



KJV – cleave WOOD upon the ground

Sheol is place of unrighteous dead

Sheol appears 66x in O.T. – all about Death

KJV translated Sheol as "Hell" or "Grave" or "Pit"

NIV often translates Sheol as "Death"

Sheol is unseen world ...

translated in Greek O.T., LXX, as *Hades*

Job 26:6, Sheol is naked before God, and Abaddon has no covering.

Psalm 6:5, For there is no remembrance of You in death; who can thank You in Sheol?

Sheol is place of pain & distress in Ps. 116:3; weakness in Isa. 14:10; helplessness in Ps. 88:4; hopelessness in Isa. 38:10; destruction Isa. 38:17



Yet, in the context of Psalm 141

What does verse 7 ... MEAN?

⁷ As when one plows and breaks up the soil, turning up rocks, so our bones have been scattered at the mouth of Sheol.



BONES do not lie there in order that they may continue lying, but that they may rise up anew,

as the seed that is sown sprouts up out of the upturned earth.... We here discern the hope of a resurrection....

As in the figure of a husbandman.

We all DO DIE ... our BONES dry out to DUST



KJV ⁷ Our bones are scattered at the grave's mouth, as when one cutteth and cleaveth WOOD upon the earth.

Spurgeon* sees something else ... precious even

There seemed to be no life, no cohesion, no form, order, or headship among the godly party in Israel ...

David himself was like one of these dried bones ...

no vitality or union among the holy seed; but their cause lay at death's door.

As when one cutteth and cleaveth wood upon the earth.

They were like wood divided and thrown apart:

Spurgeon* continues

not as one piece of timber ...

but all cut to pieces, and thoroughly divided.

Leaving out the word "wood", which is supplied by the translators, the figure relates to cleaving upon the earth, which probably means ploughing

But may signify any other form of chopping and splitting, such as felling a forest, tearing up bushes,

or otherwise causing confusion and division.

How often have good men thought ... of God!

Spurgeon* continues

Wherever they have looked, death, division, and destruction have stared them in the face.

Cut and cloven, hopelessly sundered! ...

Split up and split for the fire!

Such the cause of God and truth has seemed to be.

"Upon the earth" ... field of the church was ploughed, burrowed, and scarified ... a wood chopper's yard,

where everything was doomed to be broken up.

We have seen churches in such a state....



Spurgeon* continues

What a mercy that there is always a place

above the earth to which we can look!

There lives One who will give a resurrection to his cause, and a reunion to his divided people.

He will bring up the dead bones from the grave's mouth

Divided House against itself cannot stand ...

We cannot serve Two Masters ...

Do NOT let me die! ... If I live ... If I LIVE ...

If I survive ... If I make it out of this Satan Abyss ...

NIV, "Do not give me over to death."

HCSB, "Do not let me DIE."

That has to say something to you and me

NONE of us have been tracked ... hunted like a deer

Oh, some of us have faced DEATH ...

Though not HUNTED ... many of us have faced death

Some of us ... in our family or our person ... ILLNESS

Facing Surgery – Oh, God, "DO NOT LET ME DIE!"

Facing our mortality ... the possibility of our END

BEFORE our work on earth is done!





8-10 The Promise - LORD—Protect Me from the Trap Think and FEEL this ... Look at this verse CLOSELY ... ⁸ But my eyes look to You, Lord God. I seek refuge in You; DO NOT LET ME DIE. David did NOT say, "I look to you." It is in the third person ... almost as though "his eyes" looked, but David's HEART was FAINT David SOUGHT refuge ... but afraid to DIE Oh, what dire words are these? Very similar in tone and temper to any of us Who may have faced our Mortal End

David was not physically ill ... he was hunted

Protect me from the trap they have set for me, and from the snares of evildoers.

We look back ... God answered David's prayer

This was a Vesper Service prayer ... used in the

Evening Services at the close of the day

David wrote it AFTER the Rescue ... AFTER being Saved.

I dare say ... if you and I have FACED death

it is a good and healthy exercise to ...
